Imagine having no place to go at the end of your day, Now Imagine... A Place Called Home we can help...



In these tough economic times our agency has seen an increase in the need for our services both in our shelter and in our 'Homeless Prevention Programs' As the country is still seemingly shaky on the economic front, we expect our numbers will continue to rise and that more trends will be identified. These past few months in particular have been extremely busy

with a record 93% occupancy rate. Most nights we are full to capacity and need to use local motels for our overflow. Single males, females, along with families with children make up a

very diverse community at A Place Called Home - arriving with 'no where else to go' and as each group leaves - new people arrive and the dynamics change depending on the age and make up of each group.

We were pleased and thankful once again to be approved for funding by our local United Way for our 'On Call Program' giving us the ability to bring in 2nd staff during times of emergency or higher than usual numbers in our hostel.

This past month our residents consisted of five children under the age of four from a total of three families. This made for a very busy household combined with nine single people, many



of whom had little life experience living with children. Staff reported that although it is always sad to see families in the position of being homeless; the children always brighten everyone's day.

Seniors and Youth continue to be the growing sector when it comes to Homelessness during tough economic times. Jobs are fewer and they are harder for young people to find due to their lack of experience and training. Seniors on fixed incomes come face to face with the reality that the wait list for affordable housing is approximately three years or more.

From Jan. to Aug. our Hostel has supported 237 individuals providing 3,970 Bednights – 191 singles, 21 families. The daily rate funded by the government is currently at \$41.10 per bed night...our actual costs however are \$47.84, (a shortfall of \$6.74 per person per day). In addition we are not funded for empty beds nor are we funded for all who need our help. This results in us relying heavily on the generosity of those in our community (individuals, businesses, church groups,

service clubs etc) who have made A Place Called Home their charity of choice supplemented by some funding from private Foundations and our own fundraising efforts.

Emergency Home Energy & Resource

The month of August shows that client's needs were at an all time high. One trend was an increase in the number of senior clients and a high proportion of them seeking to re-enter the work force simply to keep up with the

high energy costs. Fortunately the program was successful in assisting clients of all ages to stay in their own homes.

Youth in Transition

In August the YIT program provided services to 20 youth. Eight of the youth accessed our

hostel services, 12 youth were outreach clients receiving help with basic living skills. All are attending school and all but two have found housing. They are still working on getting housing and hopefully they will find a permanent home by Oct. 1st.

Identification Clinic has processed approximately 30 birth certificates, one marriage certificate and 16 SIN cards this month. While most of our clients who come for help in obtaining their I.D. need financial assistance to pay for the fees, we also help those who just need help with the process. Our staff expressed their

pleasure this month in assisting a 93-year-old woman who needed some help completing her birth certificate application. All of her ID had been stolen and she kept being directed to complete the application online. As her credit card was also stolen and she was not familiar with the internet, this presented problem for her. Our staff was able to complete the

application with her and provide her direction on sending it in and was also able to walk her through the next steps needed to replace her SIN, OAS, Library and Health Cards.



We Get By With a Little Help from Our Friends


